One of the most extensive zipline systems in the East, the Pipestem Peaks zipline tour measures more than 300 feet off the ground with speeds up to 50 mph and includes nine zips, a cable bridge and an epic belay. While zipping through the treetops, take in the stunning panoramic views of the dense West Virginia forest and the iconic Bluestone River Gorge.

If high adventure isn't your style, admire West Virginia's iconic scenery on an aerial tram tour. The aerial tramway at **Hawks Nest State Park** takes visitors on a tranquil ride from the peak of the New River Gorge Canyon to the marina at the bottom where more adventure awaits.

Seeking more stunning mountain views? The tramway at **Pipestem Resort** leads you through lush treetops before descending the Bluestone River Gorge, where you'll discover more cozy mountain accommodations and fine dining.

BOATING

Boating is one of the best ways to experience the scenic beauty found at West Virginia's state parks and forests. Enjoy a relaxing afternoon river cruise or take the family out for an escape on the cool, tranquil waters. Whether you opt for a motorized adventure or a paddle-guided glide, West Virginia's waters are the place to launch your adventure.

Take a journey and explore **Beech Fork State Park's** sprawling lake. With 31 miles of shoreline to explore, you can rent canoes, kayaks, jon boats, paddleboats and stand up paddle boards at the park's boat dock for your float adventure.

Known for its peaceful setting and breathtaking views, **Tygart Lake State Park** is a relaxing getaway. Thanks to the park's 1,750-acre lake, it is a popular destination for boating, fishing and watersports.

If you are looking for a spot to drop a line, head to **North Bend State Park** in the Mid-Ohio Valley. The stunning beauty of the park is rivaled only by the excellent fishing it provides. Seasoned anglers love this spot stocked with bass, crappie, catfish and muskie.

GOLF

At West Virginia's state parks and forests, take a swing on golf courses surrounded by majestic mountain views, lush forests and the subtle sounds of nature. Cacapon Resort State Park is home to a Robert Trent Jones masterpiece. This course features 73 well-placed sand bunkers and a pro-favorite challenging double green that is more than 100 yards wide. Golfers seeking sweeping gorge views should look no further than the championship 18-hole course at **Pipestem Resort State Park**. The stunning course was designed by the renowned Geoffrey Cornish.

Open year-round, try your hand at the picturesque **Twin Falls Resort State Park** 18-hole course. Set in the park's tranquil landscape, the course was co-designed by Geoffrey Cornish and George Cobb and presents a challenge for all skill levels.

An Arnold Palmer Signature Course, the Palmer Course at **Stonewall Resort State Park** offers multiple tee selections, rolling hills and the calm beauty of a 2,600 acre lake. Or reserve a tee time at **CanaanValley Resort State Parks'** 18-hole, par-72 golf course settled in a quiet valley with towering mountain views. Designed by Geoffrey Cornish, the course features 65 sand bunkers and eight water hazards.

Whether you're looking to add a round of golf to your mountain adventure or enjoy a full golf getaway, let West Virginia's state parks be at the heart of your game.

HIKING TRAILS



Looking for more heavenly mountain views? Hike the Islandin-the-Sky Trail at **Babcock State Park**. This trail passes by the historic Glade Creek Grist Mill. Watch the water cascade over the rocks at this photographer's dream location or opt for adventure along the steeper parts of the trail.

HUNTING AND FISHING

Hunting and fishing are outdoor traditions in the Mountain State. West Virginia's state forests provide acres of hunting access for large and small game, and the streams and rivers throughout the state parks system are perfect for casting a line.

Thriving black bear, whitetail deer and eastern wild turkey populations provide exciting challenges for bow, rifle, shotgun and black powder hunting. Small game and upland bird populations provide added time in the woods to pursue squirrel, grouse, dove and pheasant in West Virginia. Big game hunting can be found at each of the nine state forests, including **Panther State Forest**, located in one of the four bow-only counties.

Diverse and exciting, fishing in the Mountain State ranges from prized smallmouth and largemouth bass, walleye and panfish to brown, rainbow and golden trout and the elusive muskie. West Virginia's lakes, rivers and streams all offer unique casting options, and the innovative trout stocking program ensures the dispersal of trout to provide outstanding spin and fly fishing for everyone.

Strike gold during West Virginia's Gold Rush, a week of special stockings when the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources releases thousands of golden rainbow trout into lakes and streams around the state, including several state parks. Gold Rush is the perfect time to enjoy a favorite pastime and provides the chance to reel in a treasured golden rainbow trout.

West Virginia's state parks and forests offer a variety of lodging options for a hunting retreat, ranging from lodge rooms to cabins to campsites; all provide convenient access to West Virginia's finest public hunting and fishing areas.

Before heading to the woods, purchase all the necessary licenses and stamps at WVdnr.gov.

MOUNTAIN BIKING

Take a ride through beautiful ridges and breathtaking landscapes as you explore hundreds of trails perfect for all levels of bikers. West Virginia's state parks and forests offer everything from screaming downhillers to gentle rail trails to suit riders from beginner to expert.

If you're new to mountain biking, **North Bend State Park** and the nearby **North Bend Rail Trail** offer ideal, gentle flow recreational trails. The Quest outdoor adventure program on site at the park provides an introduction to mountain biking, which includes oneon-one instruction for beginners and intermediates.

Tucked away just twenty minutes from the capital city of Charleston, **Kanawha State Forest** has ideal terrain for expert mountain bike adventurers. Try out the mile-long steep and challenging Black Bear trail or the more classic Middle Ridge trail with its lush tree-lined 8-mile stretch. If you are still seeking more trails, travel south to bike along the **Greenbrier River Trail**.

Coopers Rock State Forest, just off I-68 outside Morgantown, has more than 50 miles of trails — many with spectacular views of the Cheat River Canyon. Wind through rhododendron tunnels and magnificent rock formations on the Rock City trail or follow Clay Run to discover Henry Clay Furnace, a towering stone structure built in the mid-1800s to smelt iron ore extracted from the area.

MUSEUMS AND HISTORICAL SITES

Step into the past and uncover the fascinating history of West Virginia at the various museums and historical sites across the state park and forest system. Many of West Virginia's state parks and forests were designated as such because of the history surrounding the area. Explore onsite exhibits and artifacts at **Droop Mountain Battlefield**, **Fairfax Stone, Carnifex Ferry Battlefield, Prickett's Fort, Tu-Endie-Wei, Watters Smith Memorial** and **Blennerhassett Island Historical state parks**. Many of the park museums are open to visitors during the warmer months.

Immerse yourself in living history at **Prickett's Fort State Park**, where visitors can enjoy a guided tour through the reconstructed fort, which served as a place of refuge during colonial times. Or escape to **Blennerhassett Island Historical State Park** and be whisked away in a horse-drawn carriage around the island. Admire the grand Palladian mansion, a focal point of the park, which once served as the headquarters for Aaron Burr's military expedition in the early 1800s.

See history come to life at **Droop Mountain Battlefield** and **Carnifex Ferry Battlefield state parks**. In the autumn of years ending in even numbers, the parks host Civil War reenactments to act out the living history for which they are named.

OFF-ROADING

West Virginia's mountainous terrain and rolling hills provide for world-class ATV rides that unleash fun and adventure for beginners and experts alike. Home to one of the most extensive ATV trail networks in the country, the Mountain State offers hundreds of miles of rugged backcountry trails — many of which are easily accessed at a nearby state park or forest.

The Hatfield-McCoy Trail System includes more than 700 miles of trails that wind through the mountains of southern West Virginia. Located near the trailheads of the Hatfield-McCoy Trail System, **Chief Logan, Little Beaver** and **Twin Falls Resort state parks** provide convenient mountain accommodations that are ideal for an overnight stay after a long day on the trails.

Discover more ATV adventures at Mountwood ATV Park, where riders can explore 25 miles of easy-to-difficult winding trails leading to spectacular views. Located nearby, **North Bend State Park** is a peaceful retreat surrounded by quiet rolling hills, serene lakes and tranquil streams. After an ATV adventure, North Bend's vacation cabins and lodge provide cozy accommodations for an evening of relaxation.

More than 60 miles of ATV trails — perfect for all-terrain, offroad and utility vehicles as well as off-road motorcycles — are also waiting to be explored at **Cabwaylingo State Forest**.

West Virginia's state parks and forests provide easy access and accommodations no matter what type of ATV adventure you seek. Find a trail and an adventure with a mountain view is yours to discover.

SCENIC TRAIN RIDES

Experience the beauty of Almost Heaven on the rails with a train ride at **Cass Scenic Railroad State Park**. These excursions preserve a booming era in West Virginia history when steam-driven locomotives were an essential part of everyday life. Listen to the sound of the engines chug along through the mountains as you admire the stunning views.

Hop aboard as a historic steam-powered locomotive transports you on either a 2-hour trip to Whittaker Station or a 4.5-hour round trip to Bald Knob, one of the highest peaks in West Virginia. Witness breathtaking views and learn more about the rich history that filled the mountains on the Bald Knob excursion, a visitor favorite.

Make a stop at the Cass Company Store gift shop, open daily, grab a bite at The Last Run Restaurant and Soda Fountain, and wind down with an overnight stay at one of the historic company houses.

Train rides depart seasonally Tuesdays through Sundays, along with several other special events throughout the year.

SNOW SPORTS

The mountains are majestic year-round, but they shine a little brighter as white snow blankets the peaks in winter. Cooler temperatures bring a new season of adventure in West Virginia's state parks and forests, which host some of the best snow recreation in the region.

Hit the slopes at **Canaan Valley Resort State Park**. Ski, snowboard or tube the snow-covered mountains for a full day of family fun. Sharpen your skates at the outdoor ice rink or glide through the winter wilderness with cross-country skiing and snowshoeing.

Enjoy a unique adventure as you race down more than a quarter-mile of fresh mountain powder at **Blackwater Falls State Park's** sled run. Or experience more winter fun at **Pipestem Resort State Park**, where guests can rent a sled from the park or bring their own to slide down the resort's gentle slopes.

Warm up after a day of outdoor excitement with a cozy mountain lodge stay. Cuddle up next to a fire and enjoy the pristine view of the frosty season at West Virginia's state parks and forests.

SWIMMING

Dive into fun at West Virginia's state parks and forests' pools, splash parks and nature-made swimming holes.

Splash and play all day at **Pipestem Resort State Park's** adventure lake and splash park. With 18 different water features — including dumping buckets and spraying flowers — the splash park is full of fun for the little ones. For a bit more action, check out the adventure lake where inflatable mountains, slides, trampolines and more await as well as a beach area with lounge chairs to relax and catch some rays.


BLACKWATER FALLS STATE PARK Davis, WV

Take in a spectacular scene at **Blackwater Falls State Park**, located in the Allegheny Mountains of Tucker County. Tinted by the tannic acid of fallen hemlock and red spruce needles, Blackwater Falls, the 57-foot cascade from which the park draws its name, is a sight to behold. The falls, along with a few of the park's other features like Elakala Falls, Lindy Point and Pendleton Point Overlook, are some of the state's most photographed spots. Visitors can enjoy the scenic views year-round by taking the steps to the falls or using the viewing platforms. Stay overnight at the park's comfortable lodge, in a cozy cabin nestled in the woods or at a campsite under the stars.



Blackwater Falls State Park





A favorite destination for adventurers since the 1800s, Blackwater Falls State Park was established as a state park in 1937. Over the years, the park has expanded its accommodations and recreational opportunities to include a lodge, cabins, fishing, 20 miles of hiking trails, the longest sledding magic carpet on the East Coast and more.

SLEDDING & CROSS COUNTRY SKIING

The sled run at Blackwater Falls is a one-ofa-kind winter attraction that delights visitors of all ages. Open mid-December through February, the sled run is the epitome of familyfriendly fun. It provides an exhilarating rush of cold mountain air with a brisk ride down a quarter-mile of fresh powder surrounded by frosted evergreens.

Add more winter adventure by renting crosscountry skis or snowshoes and tackling some of Blackwater Falls' snow-covered trails. The park has more than 20 miles of hiking trails and ten miles of cross-country skiing trails.





LODGE

Perched on Blackwater Canyon's south rim, the park's lodge provides a sweeping view of the gorge and features a restaurant, conference center, pool and game room.



CABINS

Blackwater Falls has 39 fully-furnished cabins set in a wooded area near the lodge. Each is equipped with Wi-Fi, a flat-screen television and bath with shower.



CAMPING

Blackwater Falls offers a 65-unit tent and trailer campground, open late April through October 31, with individual sites, a bathhouse, laundromat and a dumping station.

TOP TRAILS



🜲 ELAKALA TRAIL

Offering an exceptional view of Elakala Falls, this trail starts at the south end of Blackwater Lodge, continues along the canyon rim and ends at the main park road access across from Balanced Rock Trail.

Distance: 0.5 miles Difficulty: Moderate

LINDY POINT TRAIL

Located one mile past the sled run parking area, this trail sits at 3,000 feet overlooking the lush Blackwater Canyon. The trail has a small parking area one mile below the sled run. In the winter, skiers can cross-country ski to the scenic overlook.

Distance: 0.3 miles Difficulty: Moderate

PASE POINT TRAIL

An extension of the Dobbin House Trail, this path runs through hardwoods and rhododendron to Pase Point, overlooking the north fork of the Blackwater River.

Distance: 0.7 miles Difficulty: Difficult

INSIDER TIPS



POST-RAINFALL WONDER Head to the falls after a heavy rain to delight in the surge of water and see these natural wonders in all of their glory.



FUN IN THE SUN Open Memorial Day to Labor Day, Pendleton Lake is perfect for splashing around and fun in the sun. Rent kayaks, canoes, paddleboats and stand up paddle boards. After Labor Day, boat rentals are only available on weekends.



FISHING Blackwater Falls is a perfect place for a fishing trip. Anglers can catch bass, bluegill, catfish and trout at Pendleton Lake.

CACAPON RESORT STATE PARK Berkeley Springs, WV

STATE PARKS

Positioned in the shadow of a folded mountain ridge in West Virginia's Eastern Panhandle **Cacapon Resort State Park** is a 6,000-acre, yearround destination. RIDGE TRAIL

Starting at the bathhouse or the bridge near Cacapon Lake, this trail leads past Oriskany Sandstone outcroppings and provides a scenic view from the top of the ridge. Elevations range from 900 to 1,080 feet.

PINEY RIDGE TRAIL

This short but scenic trail, ranging in elevation from 950 to 1,100 feet, leads through pine and mixed oak forest.

Distance: 1-mile loop Difficulty: Easy

HAWKS NEST STATE PARK Ansted, WV



Nestled in the heart of rafting country, the spectacular views and endless opportunities for outdoor recreation make **Hawks Nest State Park** a favorite among visitors traveling to the New River Gorge. The park is only 10 miles from the famous New River Gorge Bridge and offers easy access to the region's whitewater rapids, rock climbing and scenic hiking trails. Ride the river on a jetboat, savor the scenery from the aerial tram or explore your surroundings on a hike.







Long before Hawks Nest State Park became a park, the area was a nesting ground for osprey and a pass-through for the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway. Today, you can still see birds of prey soar overhead at the scenic overlooks. Even the occasional train passes through, connecting you to bygone times.

TRAM AND JET BOAT RIDES

With so much to do in the New River Gorge, it can be a challenge to fit it all in, but make sure you plan time for adventuring at Hawks Nest. The park's top attraction is the aerial tramway. Offering stunning views all summer long, enjoy a special trip in October when the tram reopens for the spectacular fall foliage season. The scenic lift is open daily — except Wednesdays — and takes visitors from the top of the New River Gorge canyon located at the park's lodge down to the marina. From there, you can top off your excursion with a jet boat ride on the New River. As part of the ride you'll be able to see the majestic New River Gorge Bridge from the water below.



LODGE

Hawks Nest's 31-room lodge is located on the rim of the New River Gorge, allowing guests to be close to the action but also offering a restful retreat after an exciting day. Appreciate the panoramic views, including the New River Gorge Bridge, from an intimate, private balcony or the restaurant.

TOP TRAILS

🛦 FISHERMAN'S TRAIL

Distance: 1.8 miles Difficulty: Easy

CLIFFSIDE TRAIL

This is an excellent trail for viewing the geology of the New River Gorge, high Nutall sandstone cliffs and the waterfall of Turkey Creek. Starting behind the Midland Trail shelter, near the lodge, it ends near the main overlook on Rt. 60.

Distance: 1.7 miles

Difficulty: Moderate to Difficult

WHITEWATER RAFTING

Try a new adventure while at Hawks Nest. Nestled in the heart of West Virginia's whitewater rafting country, the park's lodge is conveniently located near several whitewater rafting outfitters.



GORGEOUS SUNRISES AND SUNSETS

Watch the sunrise at the park's main overlook or view the sunset from your lodge room's private balcony.



NEW RIVER GORGE BRIDGE

Hawks Nest is located just 10 miles from the incredible New River Gorge Bridge. Catch a ride from the marina on a jet boat for a great view from below or drive to the bridge and enjoy Bridge Walk for a breathtaking view from above.

NORTH BEND STATE PARK Cairo, WV

Found among the Mid-Ohio Valley's rolling hills, lakes and streams, **North Bend State Park** offers a multitude of recreational facilities in a beautiful scenic setting. Named for the horseshoe curve of the North Fork of the Hughes River, this year-round park is home to miles of beautiful hiking trails and abundant wildlife. North Bend is located near Cairo and Harrisville and is best known for the 72-mile North Bend Rail Trail, which follows a railbanked B&O Railroad corridor with several tunnels along the way. Visitors may also still observe a few of the old wells present in the park.



You'll want to spend plenty of time on the water during your visit to Stonewall Resort. With the mountains of West Virginia as your backdrop, take a short cruise around Stonewall Lake on a boat or paddle the peaceful waters in a kayak or canoe. Cast a line and reel in a trophy bass or muskie. The lake has a marina where you can rent a pontoon or CraigCat or launch your own boat. You can also rent kayaks, canoes, stand up paddle boards, paddleboats and aqua cycles for an active time on the water.

Stonewall Resort's Adirondack-style lodge reflects 1920s architecture with modern amenities. The guest rooms offer breathtaking views of the lake and surrounding rolling hills.

CAMPING

Open year-round, Briar Point Campground is a favorite West Virginia camping spot. It offers lakeside RV and tent campsites with all the amenities you'll need to enjoy nature.

TOP TRAILS



LAKESIDE NATURE TRAIL

This trail is a gentle loop that starts at the lodge and follows the lake before crossing the park road and meandering up and back along Carrion Bay. It offers scenic views of the lake and remote areas of the park.

Distance: 3.2 miles Difficulty: Easy

HEAVENER'S ORCHARD TRAIL

Beginning near Stonewall Resort's welcome center, this trail ascends 200 feet and winds around a meadow where you can see wildflowers and plenty of wildlife.

Distance: 3.2 miles Difficulty: Moderate

AUTUMN LAUREL BROOK TRAIL

This trail starts near the cottages and follows the lakeshore, passing through natural habitats for deer, turkey, squirrels, chipmunks, birds and box turtles, until it ascends to Chipmunk Point.

Distance: 1.5 miles Difficulty: Moderate

HISTORY AND ACTIVITIES

Two waterfalls, Marsh Fork and Black Fork Falls, were the inspiration behind Twin Falls Resort State Park's name. Over the years the park has added an 18-hole golf course, cabins, swimming pool, lodge, 25 miles of hiking and biking trails and other features. A reconstructed pioneer homestead is Twin Falls Resort's crown jewel.

PIONEER FARM

Get a glimpse of what life was like on the frontier by visiting Twin Falls Resort's authentic Pioneer Farm. One of the park's most popular attractions, Pioneer Farm is fully-functional and a piece of living history. It was reconstructed during the park's development in the 1970s and is maintained by live-in caretakers. Although Pioneer Farm is a private residence, interpretive public programs are offered. Visit early in the morning or late in the evening when the animals are most active to capture an iconic picture.

TOP TRAILS



FALLS TRAIL

This rolling trail leads to two waterfalls, Marsh Fork and Black Fork Falls. Be mindful; the terrain varies from paved to rocky.

Distance: 1.25 miles Difficulty: Moderate



CLIFFSIDE TRAIL

Though this trail begins with a gentle slope along a ridgetop, it becomes rocky and strenuous at an outer loop that goes through a rhododendron thicket. Two prominent vistas can be seen on the outer loop.

Distance: 3.5 miles

Difficulty: Moderate to Difficult

HEMLOCK TRAIL

The trail starts at the campground and gradually descends on a path dominated by hemlock and rhododendron. Following a stream, it ends at an intersection of the Nature and Falls trails.

Distance: 1.25 miles Difficulty: Easy

INSIDER TIPS



OFF-ROAD ADVENTURE Twin Falls Resort is located near the Pinnacle Creek Trailhead of the Hatfield-McCoy Trails system. After a day on the trails, relax and unwind at Twin Falls Resort's beautiful mountaintop lodge.



VIEW THE FALLS Marsh Fork and Black Fork Falls are best viewed in the spring or after a rainstorm when the waterfalls are at peak flow.



HIT THE LINKS Play a round of golf on Twin Falls' 18-hole course. Equipment rentals are available, in case you don't have your own clubs, and the course is open year-round, weather permitting.

TYGART LAKE STATE PARK *Grafton, WV*

Located in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains in scenic north-central West Virginia, **Tygart Lake State Park** is one of the Mountain State's premier lakefront destinations. A quiet vacation spot with plenty of activities — both on and off the water the park makes for a perfect alternative to a typical summer beach trip. In addition to its crystalline lake, the park is surrounded by inspiring mountain views and has lakeside lodging that allows for relaxation and unwinding after a full day of play.

Only four miles south of Grafton, Tygart Lake State Park offers a beautiful beachfront experience. One of the first state parks to allow camping, it has since expanded its accommodations to allow more visitors to stay and enjoy water activities like boating, swimming, fishing, kayaking and canoeing on its gorgeous lake.

TYGART LAKE

There's no better way to enjoy a warm day than by soaking up some sun and spending time on the water. Whether you go fishing, take a lake cruise or go for a swim, Tygart Lake will keep you busy for hours. Cool off at the beach area, open Wednesday through Sunday, from Memorial to Labor Day. Boat, cruise and slip rentals are available at the Tygart Lake Marina, which is open seasonally, from mid-May through mid-September, depending on water conditions. Bringing your own boat? Ramps and parking are also available. Tygart Lake's tranquil waters are wonderful for kayaking, canoeing and stand up paddle boarding as well. Kayaks may be rented at the beach swimming area.

ACCOMMODATIONS



LODGE

A peaceful retreat, the park's 20-room lakeside lodge sits on a high peninsula overlooking the serene water below.



CABINS

Tygart Lake has 11 cabins, six of which overlook the park's stunning blue lake. These cabins are a cozy, quiet destination for couples and families who enjoy boating and water activities.



CAMPING

Tygart Lake's scenic campground has 36 sites, ten with electric and 26 standard, that are open spring through fall, weather permitting. Full hookup sites are not available.

TOP TRAILS



LAKE TRAIL

Beginning at Picnic Area 3, this hilly trail follows a small stream to Tygart Lake.

Distance: 0.5 miles

Difficulty: Easy to Moderate

TYGART DAM TRAIL

This trail, which has a few hills, starts near the lodge and follows along the lakeshore before ending at Tygart Dam.

Distance: 0.75 miles Difficulty: Easy to Moderate

DOGWOOD TRAIL

Start opposite Tygart Dam Trail, near the lodge, and pass through a forest of dogwood trees before climbing to a higher elevation above the lodge, following a ridge top and descending back on the park road from the dam.

Distance: 2 miles

Difficulty: Moderate

Discover one of West Virginia's most iconic scenes at **Babcock State Park**, located 20 miles southeast of the New River Gorge Bridge. The park is most known for the Glade Creek Grist Mill, a fully functional replica of the original Cooper's Mill, which once stood on the grounds. Babcock offers a variety of cozy cabins and beautiful campsites for guests who want to stay at the park. Other park activities include hiking, fishing and mountain biking, as well as whitewater rafting nearby in the New River Gorge.

STATE PARKS





Park Feature GLADE CREEK GRIST MILL

The Glade Creek Grist Mill at Babcock is a popular spot for photographers and artists who want to capture a stunning setting in Almost Heaven. Fully operable, the mill was created by combining pieces from three mills which once dotted the state. It is a living monument to more than 500 mills that thrived in West Virginia at the turn of the century. The Glade Creek Grist Mill produces freshly ground cornmeal, which park guests may purchase depending on availability and stream conditions.

PARK ACCOMMODATIONS

CABINS

Babcock offers 28 peaceful cabins for vacation rentals. The first 13 are located along Glade Creek close to the famous Glade Creek Grist Mill. The other 15 cabins are located deeper in the park.

CAMPING

Babcock's 52-unit campground has 28 sites with electric hookups and 24 non-electric sites. The campground can accommodate tents or trailers and has a central bathhouse with coin-operated laundry. Firewood and ice are available for purchase.

INSIDER TIPS



FISHING AT BOLEY LAKE If you like fishing, bring your rod to Boley Lake. There's a good chance you'll reel in some largemouth bass, bluegill, trout or channel catfish.



ISLAND-IN-THE-SKY TRAIL The Island-in-the-Sky trail boasts stunning vistas and high cliffs. Featuring some rocky and steep sections, the half-mile long hike is beautiful year-round.



SWINGING BRIDGE Babcock has a small swinging bridge that connects the park's cabin areas on each side of Glade Creek. Look for the unique bridge near Cabins 6 and 7.



BEECH FORK STATE PARK *Barboursville*, WV

Located in the hills of southern West Virginia, only 12 miles from Huntington, **Beech Fork State Park** is a 3,144-acre retreat with hundreds of campsites, six luxury cabins, miles of hiking trails and a sprawling 720-acre lake. Cast a line along the park's 31 miles of shoreline, or rent a boat or kayak for more water fun. Hit the trails on a mountain bike or take a dip in the pool before retiring for the evening.





Park Feature BEECH FORK LAKE

Spend a day on the water. Enjoy recreational boating, fishing and wildlife watching at Beech Fork Lake. Canoes, kayaks, jon boats, paddleboats and stand up paddle boards are available to rent at the park's boat dock, which is open from Memorial Day through Labor Day from noon to 8 p.m. Life jackets are required and provided with rentals. Or, bring your own boat. Beech Fork Lake's paved boat launch is open from April to November.

PARK ACCOMMODATIONS

CABINS

Beech Fork has six fully equipped vacation cabins with Wi-Fi that sit on the ridgeline with a beautiful view of the lake below. Enjoy gas fireplaces, open-truss ceilings, large decks and much more.

CAMPING

Beech Fork offers 275 campsites in four distinct areas, 99 of which are lakefront. All campsites have a paved parking pad, grill and picnic table. There is a seasonally operated Camper Corner Store, and Wi-Fi is available at park headquarters and Old Orchard Campground.

OUTDOOR ADVENTURE

Beech Fork has more than 14 miles of hiking and biking trails to enjoy. Discover beautiful, scenic views along the way.



GO FOR A SWIM Visitors can escape the summer heat at the park's swimming pool. Cool off and have fun in the water. The pool is open seasonally, from Memorial Day to Labor Day.




BIRDWATCHING Beech Fork is a popular spot for birdwatchers. You're likely to catch sight of migratory waterfowl or neo-tropical songbirds.

BLUESTONE STATE PARK *Hinton*, *WV*

Named after the Bluestone National Scenic River, **Bluestone State Park** is the quintessential lakeside retreat in southern West Virginia. This wilderness park, located five miles south of Hinton, is full of outdoor activities, including boating and fishing opportunities. Enjoy camping by the water or take in stunning views of the lake from your cabin's porch. Bluestone is only 20 minutes away from Pipestem Resort State Park, which offers ziplining, horseback riding and even more adventures for visitors.

STATE PARKS





Park Feature **BLUESTONE LAKE**

Bluestone's signature lake was created by the Bluestone Dam to control flooding in the area. Authorized by presidential proclamation and approved by an act of Congress in the 1930s, Bluestone Lake went through several phases of construction before, during and after World War II. Today, the park's glimmering 2,040-acre lake is the state's third largest body of water, and visitors can enjoy all sorts of aquatic activities. Bring your own boat and utilize the public boat launches or rent one of the fishing or pontoon boats, kayaks or canoes available at Bluestone Lake Marina.

PARK ACCOMMODATIONS

CABINS

Rent one of Bluestone's 26 cabins. All cabins have stone fireplaces and fully equipped kitchens and three also have picturesque views of the lake.

CAMPING

Bluestone is home to four distinct campgrounds, with a combined total of 120 campsites. Choose from water and electric sites to primitive sites that are only accessible via boat.

INSIDER TIPS



FISHING

Bluestone Lake is a prime bass, catfish, crappie and bluegill fishing location. A fishing license is required to cast a line in the lake. Licenses can be purchased online at **WVdnr.gov**.



TRAILS

Bluestone has seven hiking trails with scenic surroundings. Take the Overlook Trail, which ascends to a beautiful vista.




BLUESTONE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA

Set adjacent to Bluestone Lake, Bluestone Wildlife Management Area is also a popular fishing spot, with access to boating and stocked trout fishing in Indian Creek.

STATE PARKS

CABWAYLINGO STATE FOREST *Dunlow, WV*

Found in the Hatfield-McCoy Mountains region of southern West Virginia, **Cabwaylingo State Forest** gets its unique name from four surrounding counties: Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln and Mingo. The forest was established in the 1930s by the Civilian Conservation Corps in an effort to rebuild wooded land in southern West Virginia. Today, with more than 8,000 acres of forest to explore, visitors can unplug and unwind with a distraction-free getaway surrounded by the beauty of Almost Heaven.





Forest Feature **HISTORICAL STRUCTURES**

A living part of history, the cabins, forest headquarters and picnic shelters at Cabwaylingo were built by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), a voluntary public work relief program of young men that operated during the Great Depression. Between 1935 and 1939, two CCC companies occupied Camp Anthony Wayne (now known as Cabwaylingo), where they surveyed timber and game, fought forest fires, cleared trails and built log cabins. These legacy cabins are still used today and feature a cozy wood frame or stone construction.

FOREST ACCOMMODATIONS -

CABINS

There are 13 legacy cabins and one vacation cabin located near the center of the forest that are available from mid-April through late October. Five cabins are pet-friendly and two are wheelchair accessible.

CAMPING

Additionally, the forest welcomes group campers. Group camp facilities include two 50-person sleeping quarters and a heated and air-conditioned, fully equipped kitchen/dining facility.

INSIDER TIPS



ATV ADVENTURES

Designed for all-terrain, off-road and utility vehicles, the ATV trails at Cabwaylingo span more than 60 miles. Annual permits for riders can be purchased at the trailhead located within the forest.



CAST YOUR LINE Visitors who enjoy fishing should get some bites at the park. Fresh trout are stocked monthly, from February to May, in the west fork of Twelvepole Creek.



BLAZE A TRAIL Take a forest hike and see many varieties of wildflowers and trees, along with the overhanging rock cliffs that once provided shelter for the area's early settlers.



Cass, WV

Cass Scenic Railroad State Park offers excursions that take you back in time to when steamdriven locomotives were an essential part of everyday life. Go on a 4.5-hour scenic train ride to the overlook at Bald Knob, one of the highest points in West Virginia, and experience a spectacular view at 4,842 feet. Or take a scenic train ride to Whitaker Station, the location of an authentic logging camp. The park also features the Cass Company Store gift shop, a restaurant, an artisans co-op, the Cass Historic Theater and the Cass Historical Museum.

Park Feature **BALD KNOB**

AUTUMN BEAUTY In the fall, Cass comes alive with vibrant autumn leaves, which put on a stunning show for visitors.

PARK ACCOMMODATIONS



COMPANY HOUSES

Experience the charm of historic Cass by staying in one of the restored company houses. They can accommodate 2 to 14 people and are available year-round.



LAST RUN RESTAURANT Enjoy home cooking at the Last Run Restaurant operated by the Bodkin Sisters. The Last Run Restaurant is regularly open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Winter hours are 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday–Saturday and 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday–Wednesday.



GREENBRIER STATE FOREST *Caldwell, WV*

Covering 5,200 acres in southeastern West Virginia, **Greenbrier State Forest** delivers secluded natural beauty with a wide range of recreational options like fishing, swimming, hiking and mountain biking. The forest is just a stone's throw away from the charming and historic towns of White Sulphur Springs and Lewisburg, so visitors can enjoy a day of solitude communing with nature, then venture out for shopping, dining and the arts. With cabins and camping, Greenbrier State Forest is also an ideal base camp for bicyclists on the neighboring Greenbrier River Trail.





Forest Feature **MOUNTAIN BIKING TRAILS**

Escape to the beautiful Greenbrier Valley for a ride into nature with 19 miles of single-track mountain biking trails at Greenbrier State Forest. Crisscrossing through the woods, these trails reveal scenic views and high prospects for wildlife watching. Trails range from beginner-style mountain bike loops to full-blast, downhill descents. Gravity features such as machine-built berms and tabletops can also be found. The biking trails at the forest are great for exercise, fresh air and enjoying the beauty of Almost Heaven.

INSIDER TIPS



GREENBRIER RIVER TRAIL

A favorite of hikers, bikers, cross-country skiers, anglers and horseback riders, this 78-mile rail trail closely follows the Greenbrier River.



KATE'S MOUNTAIN Divided by the 3,280-foot tall Kate's Mountain, Greenbrier State Forest is the perfect place for a challenging hike, like the 7.8-mile Kate's Mountain Loop.

FOREST ACCOMMODATIONS

CABINS

Greenbrier State Forest offers 14 cabins in three different styles: legacy, classic and vacation. These cabins have plenty of room for the whole family, and the forest provides acres upon acres of rugged woodland for adventure.

CAMPING

Greenbrier State Forest has a 16-unit campground suitable for both tents and trailers. All sites feature electric hookups, picnic tables and fire rings. There is also a central bathhouse.



SWIM IT OUT The Greenbrier State Forest pool, open from Memorial Day weekend to Labor Day, is an ideal spot to relax during your getaway.

HOLLY RIVER STATE PARK Hacker Valley, WV

Step into a wooded wonderland at the scenic **Holly River State Park**. Located in a narrow valley in the Mountain Lakes region, the park is surrounded by heavily forested mountains, some reaching more than 2,800 feet in height. Park amenities include picnic shelters, the Holly River Restaurant and corrals for campers with horses. Holly River is known for its wide range of flora, including wildflowers and ferns, and the park's natural setting is ideal for camping, hiking, biking, swimming, fishing and other outdoor activities.

Park Feature NATURAL WONDERS

Located deep in the forest, Holly River State Park has some of the most beautiful landscapes in the state, including five waterfalls — Tecumseh Falls, Tenskwatawa Falls, Upper Falls, Shupe's Chute and Lower Falls. These falls can be accessed by either road or trail. Visitors can enjoy the view or even cool off in the water at the popular natural swimming hole at Shupe's Chute. Find the peace and quiet that only nature can provide at Holly River.

PARK ACCOMMODATIONS

CABINS

Holly River offers ten picturesque cabins constructed of natural stone and logs. These cabins can accommodate either two or four people. Cabins 1 through 9 are available from April through November, and Cabin 10 is available year-round. Cabins 6, 9 and 10 are pet-friendly.

CAMPING

Campers will find 88 sites at Holly River. All units have electric hookups, picnic tables and cooking grills. A dumping station and four centralized bathhouses are available as well as two coin-operated washers and dryers.

INSIDER TIPS



HOLLY RIVER RESTAURANT Holly River Restaurant is open daily from Memorial Day to Labor Day and on weekends in April, May, September and October.



SWISS HISTORY

Swiss immigrants settled in the area now known as Holly River around 1870. In 1938, Holly River was designated a wildlife refuge and opened as an official state park.



HOST A PICNIC

Rent a pavilion for the day or reserve a shelter up to a year in advance. Holly River offers two pavilions which are perfect spots for picnics and family gatherings. Pavilions can be booked online at **WVstateparks.com**.

KUMBRABOW STATE FOREST Huttonsville, WV

Kumbrabow State Forest is situated on top of Rich Mountain along the Western edge of the Allegheny Highlands in Randolph County. Made up of 9,474 acres at an elevation of more than 3,000 feet above sea level, it is West Virginia's highest state forest. The distinctive name "Kumbrabow" comes from the surnames of the park's earliest supporters: Governor Herman G. Kump, Spates Brady and Hubert Bowers. Kumbrabow's hiking trails, fishing streams and natural beauty make this forest an amazing mountain getaway.

Forest Feature **HIKE THE POTATO HOLE TRAIL**

Kumbrabow has a variety of scenic trails that lead to awe-inspiring overlooks of the surrounding terrain. Potato Hole Trail leads to an observation tower, offering panoramic views of the Rich Mountain area. It is a perfect place to watch stunning sunrises and sunsets.

FOREST ACCOMMODATIONS -

CABINS

Open April through the first week of December, Kumbrabow's six rustic cabins do not have electricity or running water but offer gas lighting and fully equipped kitchens. One cabin is wheelchair accessible, and all cabins are pet-friendly.

CAMPING

Open spring through fall, Kumbrabow's campground offers 13 primitive sites and one large RV site in a pristine setting near patches of rhododendron and a native brook trout stream. Campers will enjoy easy access to fire pits and picnic tables. Laundry and shower facilities are also available.

INSIDER TIPS



MILL CREEK

Cast a line at Kumbrabow's Mill Creek, a native brook trout stream. Kumbrabow's cool, mountain waters are shaded by the forest, making them an ideal habitat for trout.



UNPLUG AND UNWIND Disconnect from the day-to-day at Kumbrabow. The park's history-rich CCC-era cabins and serene natural beauty create the perfect setting to relax and reset.



HUNTING & FISHING Fishing and hunting, with a proper license, are permitted in the forest. Anglers can try to reel in catch-and-release brook trout while hunters may spot deer, bear, turkey, bobcat and ruffed grouse. Visit WVdnr.gov for rules and regulations.



STATE PARKS CABINS *

Tucked away in the wooded mountains of Hardy County in West Virginia's Eastern Panhandle, **Lost River State Park** is comprised of 3,934 quiet acres, making it an ideal getaway for nature lovers and those looking to take a break from the daily grind. Visitors are drawn to the park's secluded lodging, historical ties to the Civil War and abundance of trails — one of which leads to the iconic Cranny Crow overlook on Big Ridge Mountain.





Park Feature **HIKE TO CRANNY CROW**

The Cranny Crow overlook on Big Ridge Mountain is what sets Lost River apart in the state park system. With an elevation of 3,200 feet, Cranny Crow offers an open 270-degree panoramic view of five surrounding counties. The steep trek to the top is more suited for moderate hikers than beginners, but the view that awaits is worth every drop of sweat. To reach Cranny Crow, hikers can start on the White Oak trail (1.5 miles) and connect to Miller's Rock (less than .25 mile). At the overlook, visitors will find a small stone structure to rest and take in the scenery before making their descent.

PARK ACCOMMODATIONS

CABINS

Lost River has 26 cozy cabins with modern amenities available for guests. Classic and vacation cabins are available all year, and legacy cabins are available from April through October.

CAMPING

The park has two primitive campsites including one horse-friendly site. There are also three additional campsites near the upper shelter No. 2 area. These sites have restrooms located nearby and showers available but only during select hours.

INSIDER TIPS



HORSEBACK RIDING See Lost River from a new perspective with a guided horseback ride. Guided rides are offered from Memorial Day to from Labor Day. Private riding is available year-round after

registering at the park office.



CIVIL WAR HISTORY Lost River is home to the Lee Cabin, home of Henry "Lighthorse Harry" Lee, a Revolutionary War general and father of Civil War General Robert E. Lee.




HIT THE TRAILS There are 19 hiking trails at Lost River, including nine horse-friendly trails for visitors who would like to bring their steeds along with them.



SENECA STATE FOREST *Dunmore*, *WV*

West Virginia's oldest and largest state forest, **Seneca State Forest** is located in rugged Pocahontas County with 12,884 acres of lush woodlands to explore. Recreational opportunities include boating in Seneca Lake or the nearby Greenbrier River or hiking or biking 23 miles of trails. Relax in a rustic cabin or campsite. Seneca is perhaps best known for the Thorny Mountain Fire Tower, which provides sweeping panoramas and is available to book for overnight stays.





Forest Feature **STAY IN A FIRE TOWER**

The Thorny Mountain Fire Tower is one of West Virginia's state parks and forests' most iconic attractions. The 65-foot tower provides 360-degree views of the forest and an unobstructed outlook of the night sky. Visitors will climb three flights of stairs to a 14×14 cab, which includes a catwalk around the outside. The tower may be reserved for overnight stays between May and October. It has two cots but can accommodate up to four guests. To enjoy this unique stay, guests are encouraged to make reservations up to a year in advance because the tower books up fast.

FOREST ACCOMMODATIONS -

CABINS

Open April through October, Seneca's eight rustic cabins do not have electricity or running water but offer gas lighting and fully equipped kitchens. A central bathhouse, shower and laundry facilities are located near the office.

CAMPING

Seneca offers 10 large, secluded campsites with level tent and trailer pads, picnic tables and fireplaces. Coin-operated laundry machines and free showers are available at the office.

INSIDER TIPS



HUNT & FISH

Fishing and hunting, with a proper license, are permitted in the forest. Deer, bear, turkey and small game animals are popular, and Seneca Lake is stocked with trout in the spring and fall. Licenses can be purchased online at WVdnr.gov.



RIDE THE RAILS Visitors can take a day trip over to nearby Cass Scenic Railroad State Park for scenic train rides and a look back at West Virginia's timber history.



HIT THE TRAILS Seneca has 12 challenging hiking trails and is also close to the Allegheny and Greenbrier River trails for explorers that want a longer trek.



WATOGA STATE PARK Marlinton, WV

STATE PARKS CABINS A

Watoga State Park opened to the public in July 1937 and is West Virginia's largest state park. With over 10,000 acres of sprawling forest, Watoga has endless recreational activities and some of the most popular campgrounds and cabins in the state. Visitors can enjoy the park's 11-acre lake or take a hike on 40 miles of trails. Watoga also has an outdoor swimming pool with solar heating that is open from Memorial Day to Labor Day.





Park Feature WATOGA LAKE

Built in 1933 and formerly known as Lake Killibuck, Watoga Lake is 11 acres of pure bliss. For those looking to cast a line, Watoga Lake has plenty of largemouth bass, channel catfish, bluegill and trout. Or, for a little more action, visitors can rent paddleboats, row boats, canoes and kayaks for a nominal fee between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Personal boats are permitted on Watoga Lake, but motors are restricted to electric, trolling motors only.

PARK ACCOMMODATIONS

CABINS

Nestled into a gorgeous backdrop, Watoga's classic and vacation cabins are open year-round, and legacy cabins are available from April through October. Depending on standard or modern type, the cabins can accommodate between two and eight people.

CAMPING

Watoga has two campgrounds available. The Beaver Creek Campground has 38 units, including 12 electric hookups. The Riverside Campground has 50 units with 38 electric hookups. A central bathhouse and coin-operated laundry is also available to campers.

INSIDER TIPS



BROOKS MEMORIAL ARBORETUM

The 400-acre Brooks Memorial Arboretum at Watoga includes 6.5 miles of interconnected trails and signs along the way, which identify the trees, plants and shrubs found there.



EXPLORE THE AREA For more mountain adventure, visit one of the several nearby state parks and forests. Explore ancient rock formations at Beartown State Park or hike the 78-mile Greenbrier River Trail.



GAME COURT AND PLAYGROUNDS

Watoga's game court features tennis, basketball, volleyball, horseshoes and disc golf. There is also playground equipment at the recreation building and campgrounds.

With its riverside camping, Alum Cave rock overhang and Middle Fork River access, Audra is great for summer vacations and weekend getaways.

Camp Creek, WV

The pristine area was officially named a state park in 1987 after 550 acres were marked off from the Camp Creek State Forest. Located off I-77 in Mercer County, the park is great for family trips and stop-overs during a scenic drive through southern West Virginia.

NORTH BEND RAIL TRAIL *Cairo, WV*
